

Reconciling Realities: Making sense and finding hope in the new normal by Margaret H Crighton

For some it's the death of a loved one, or divorce, or the birth of a child with disabilities. For me it was a brain injury, that thing that shatters your world into the before and after.

It was June 2008, five days after Baxter and I announced our engagement, that my car was rear-ended. In that moment my life – and our life together- was forever changed. Brain injury had come and it was planning to stay.

At the time of my accident I was working as a professor of nursing. I loved my work, which was unexpected. God called me very clearly into an academic career, but I went into my nursing PhD program kicking and screaming. Generous as He is, I quickly realized that what people had been telling me for years was true: combining patient research with teaching tapped all my interests and talents. I enjoyed every aspect of the role, and thrived.

I don't recall when I realized that life had forever changed. I do remember that as the weeks passed and I did not improve, I thought, "this is taking forever." When I walked down the aisle in December, 2008, I had been walking independently for only about 10 days. I would not drive again for 4 years, and I would not return to the work I loved. The life we thought we'd have with a house full of kids and both of us in professions we loved: GONE.

It has been 11 years, and still I find this new reality very spiritually confusing. Why would God take away that to which He had so clearly called me? I don't know, but I believe unequivocally in God's promises that "He works <u>all things</u> for the good of those who love him..." (Romans 8:28), that He ..."has plans to prosper me and not to harm me, to give me a hope and a future" (Jeremiah 29:11). Interestingly, the earlier verses of chapter 29 discuss how the Israelites were to settle down and thrive in exile in Babylon.

I can relate to those Israelites. Although I don't like it, I am trying to live well in this new land of brain injury. Life is very different. It is challenging. I don't feel well most of the time, and I miss my work and my students dreadfully, every day. Some days I absolutely hate this exile. And yet in the midst of heartache and suffering there is blessing. God is using this season to heal other areas of my life; I now have great appreciation for the invisibility of illness; I have been forced into a much slower pace, and notice joy filled details such as children laughing and the exquisite beauty of a single flower blossom and its reflection of God's faithfulness.

I can't see the fruit of my labors like I did when I was working, but I trust that He is still using me, even if the fruit is concealed. In the "now" I believe God is calling me to simply do the next thing, trusting Him with the outcome. I Peter 4:19 says "...let those who suffer...entrust their souls to a faithful Creator while doing good." For me, doing good is on a much smaller scale. It might be as mundane as completing a load of laundry, or reaching out to a friend who is hurting.

What do we do with a life that appears derailed? I don't know the full answer, but while I continue seeking it, I stand secure in these truths: God loves me. He is trustworthy. He is faithful. He does have a plan.

Today, I strive to simply do the next thing he has called me to, and rest in the hope of another promise:

After you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace [who imparts His blessing and favor], who called you to His own eternal glory in Christ, will Himself complete, confirm, strengthen, and establish you [making you what you ought to be]. 1 peter 5:10 (AMP)

I leave you with this promise and pray that you too will keep journeying toward peace as we reconcile our new reality with the old - and even thrive in what might still feel like exile.


